## A New Spin on Golf Lessons



SFPGA Professional **Dave McNulty** and the First Tee of the Palm Beaches offer a brand new SPIN on golf lessons using the Paramobile, an all-terrain adapted golf cart for physically limited players. Teaching lessons weekly at the Palm Beach County Therapeutic Recreation Services in Lake Worth, Dave and the Paramobile offer wheelchair users a new level of freedom and independence.

The Paramobile was originally designed for disabled golfers. With its strong chassis frame, the Paramobile can cope with gradients of up to 30 degrees and sideways inclinations of about 17 degrees. The Paramobile will turn automatically into a safe position should these limits be exceeded. The design allows for an absolutely secure footing in any position.

**Chuck**, a regular student at Dave's Monday lessons, is a former golfer and happy to have the ability to swing a club again, thanks to the Paramobile. "I had a good drive back in the day, and I'm working on it each week with Dave. I'm looking forward to getting out on the golf course and playing a regular hole. I haven't been a regular golfer since my wife made me choose between golf and my eight children!" joked Chuck.

**Mickey**, another of Dave's students, also cracked jokes as Dave and an assistant strapped him into the chair. "I never played golf before, but I played a lot of baseball. This chair is something else... the first time it stood me upright I almost passed out! I don't do a lot of standing on my own these days."

The therapeutic benefits of the golf game for physically limited players are immense. It stimulates the metabolism, stretches the muscles,

reduces spasticities and enhances the mobility of their joints. The all-terrain Paramobile with its patented stand-up device combines practical know-how with innovative ideas for maximum playing fun. Its unequalled stability when the golfer is hitting the ball enables performance that is comparable to those of non-handicapped players.

"This device actually offers even more than the ability to golf. You can take it out on the beach or take it fly-fishing! Believe it or not, the wheel design on the Paramobile actually causes less damage on the green than this sneaker I'm wearing," said Dave. "There are less limitations for disabled players now more than ever."

Dave first learned of the Paramobile when he saw golfer Anthony Netto using one at the Honda Classic in 2010. After discussing the details, the Florida Golf Council's License Plate Program purchased a Paramobile for The First Tee of the Palm Beaches. "They aren't cheap, but they are incredibly functional. Paramobiles run around \$20,000," said Dave.

Dave teaches lessons weekly using the Paramobile and just started taking students out soon to play regular holes of golf at the First Tee's location in West Palm Beach.

On Saturday and Sunday, February 4-5, one-hundred and four junior golfers will compete at Club Med at Sandpiper Bay in Port St. Lucie, FL. The first event of the 2012 South Florida PGA Junior Tour season has a very strong field. Competing this weekend are the following: 2011 Boys 14-18 Player of the Year Derron Peyton of Boynton Beach, 2011 Ed Ficker award winner Jackson Shoенfelt of Boynton Beach, 2011 Girls 12-13 Player of the Year Emily Faulkner of Palm City, as well as Port St. Lucie residents: Jackson Huang, Taylor Sukmana, and David Torres.



This 36-hole, stroke play event is a 9am shotgun start both Saturday and Sunday. Players will be re-paired on Sunday by low score. Awards will be given to the first through third place winners in each age division (Boys/Girls 12-13, 14-15, 16-18) as well as to the overall boy and overall girl winners of the event on Sunday, following play. All South Florida PGA Junior Tour events are ranked by the national Junior Golf Scoreboard ranking system. Pairings are now available on the South Florida PGA website.

### Looking the Other Way

Rule 6-1 expressly states that the player and his caddie are responsible for knowing the Rules. What happens when a player sees his opponent or fellow competitor breach a Rule and the player decides to look the other way, ie; not apply the penalty or inform his opponent or fellow competitor that s/he has breached a rule? How should the committee deal with the player who overlooked the breach? What happens to the opponent or fellow competitor who breached the rule? In this month's segment of Rules with Drew I will try to answer those questions while using Decisions as examples.

Before trying to answer those questions, it is important to note that when an opponent, marker or fellow competitor overlooks a breach of a Rule by the player, the assumption is that the player is unaware s/he is breaching the Rule. If the player knew s/he was breaching a Rule or was in breach of a Rule, the Ruling would be different.

In a Match Play competition, Note 1 under Rule 2-5 states, "A player may disregard a breach of the Rules by his opponent provided there is no agreement by the sides to waive a Rule (Rule 1-3). Rule 1-3 states, "Players must not agree to exclude the operation of any Rule or to waive any penalty incurred." The key word in both Rule 1-3 and the Note to Rule 2-5 is Agree. If there is no agreement, there is no breach. For example, if a player watches his opponent take several practice swings in a bunker grounding his club each time (a violation of rule 13-4) and the player decides not to call the penalty on his opponent, then there is no agreement, thus there is no breach. However, if there is an agreement or understanding of a breach, then there is a penalty for overlooking the breach. For example, in

the situation given above, if the player while watching his opponent breach Rule 13-4 tells him/her, you are not allowed to ground your club in a bunker while taking practice strokes but I don't care and I'm not going to make a claim. In this instance there is an agreement between the players. Thus they would both be disqualified for a breach of Rule 2-5. Another example is Decision 1-3/4 which states, "In a match, a player discovers at the 2nd hole that he has 15 clubs in his bag contrary to Rule 4-4a, but his opponent refuses to apply the penalty. The extra club is declared out of play and the match continues. What is the ruling? Both players would be disqualified for a breach of Rule 1-3 since the players agreed to waive the penalty incurred under 4-4a. So, if you're feeling generous and don't want to apply a penalty for a breach of a Rule by your opponent, make sure you don't tell your opponent you're overlooking the breach. Once your opponent is informed of the breach, you are no longer overlooking the breach which results in an agreement if a penalty is not enforced.

Overlooking a penalty in a stroke play competition is slightly different from match play. Decision 33-7/9 states, "The responsibility for knowing the Rules lies with all players. In stroke play, the player and his marker have an explicit responsibility for the correctness of the player's score card. There may, however, be exceptional individual cases where, in order to protect the interests of every other player in the competition, it would be reasonable to expect a fellow-competitor or another competitor to bring to light a player's breach of the Rules by notifying the player, his marker or the Committee. In such exceptional circumstances, it would be appropriate for the Committee to impose a penalty of disqualification under Rule 33-7 on a fellow-competitor or another competitor if it becomes apparent that he has failed to advise the player, his marker or the Committee of a Rules breach with the clear intention of allowing that player to return an incorrect score." One of the more important concepts from this Decision is that a marker/fellow competitor needs to "protect the interests of every other player." For example, if a marker or fellow competitor sees a player breaching a rule, then s/he needs to call a penalty on that player. The marker/fellow competitor has an obligation to the rest of the field to call that penalty. If the penalty isn't called, s/he is affecting the outcome of the competition.

Another example of overlooking a penalty in stroke play would be Decision 1-3/6 which states, "In stroke play, B failed to hole out at a hole. A few holes later he realized he had erred. A, B's marker and fellow-competitor, was aware both that B had infringed the Rules and that B knew this, but nevertheless he signed B's card. B was disqualified under Rule 3-2 (Failure

to Hole Out). Should A, who knowingly overlooked the breach, be penalized? A should have been disqualified for a breach of Rule 1-3.” This Decision reiterates the concept previously introduced in Decision 33-7/9 emphasizing the importance of the marker responsibilities in stroke play. If the marker were to sign a scorecard which he knew was incorrect due to his fellow competitors’ failure to include a penalty the marker knew the competitor had incurred, the marker could suffer the same fate as the fellow competitor, disqualification. Decision 6-6a/5 is one more example of this concept and it says, “In stroke play, a competitor returned a wrong score because his score card did not include a penalty he had incurred. The competitor was unaware that he had incurred the penalty. The competitor’s marker (a fellow-competitor) was aware of the penalty but nevertheless signed the card. The facts were discovered before the result of the competition was officially announced. The competitor is, of course, disqualified (Rule 6-6d). Is the marker also subject to disqualification? Yes. The Committee should disqualify the marker under Rule 33-7.”

In match play it is understandable that a player is permitted to overlook an opponents’ breach of a Rule because the competition is played between just the two sides. However, in stroke play, every competitor is playing against every other competitor in the competition. Thus a player has an obligation to the rest of the field to keep the fellow competitors in his group honest since the rest of field is not present. Therefore, it makes perfect sense that a player would be held accountable for overlooking a breach of a Rule in stroke play. As I explained in the second paragraph, the assumption when overlooking a penalty is that the opponent, marker or fellow competitor is not aware they have incurred a penalty. The situation becomes more cloudy when the opponent, marker or fellow competitor is aware they are breaching a Rule or have breached a Rule and are trying to get away with it. I will leave the explanation of that for a future Rules with Drew column.
